Report of the President

Seventy-five of 92 councils returned the annual report survey.

Focus on the National Theme 'Here I am Lord; send me'

All 75 councils reported that they focused on the national theme, 'Here I am Lord; send me', in the following ways: attending on-line webinars (44%), guest speakers at general meetings (32%), hosting a retreat (22%), attending a workshop (16%) and other (59%). Unfortunately, the survey did not ask to list what 'other' entailed, thus, there is no explanation of other ways the councils focused on the theme.

Most councils reported that they centered on the national focus of mental health in the following ways: how mental health affects homelessness, job security, violence, etc. (25%), how to get help for those with mental health issues (25%), had a guest speaker at their general meeting (23%) and other (64%). Again, no chance to voice explanation of 'other'.

Embraced the New Structure of Executive Officers

Eighty-four percent of the councils reported that their councils embraced the new structure of executive officers, while 16% reported their councils were struggling. Some reasons for the difficulty in embracing the new structure included: inability to fill all the positions, especially for smaller councils, as perception is that there is more work for each position; an aging membership; not enough younger members to take on the roles; and not convinced the letter of good standing will encourage members to put their name forward for an executive position. Councils who embraced the new structure found that even though the number of executive officers were reduced, it did 'speed up' communication and decision making and the meetings were more focussed. Another positive mentioned was that the new Standing Committee Chair structure was working well, as each committee chair had her own working group of like-minded women to work with.

Toronto Diocesan Highlights

The 103rd Annual Diocesan Convention (April 29 & 30) focused on the new national theme, 'Here I am Lord; send me'. Here I am Lord was the focus on the first day and Send me was the focus on the second day. Over 300 members attended the business sessions. Keynote Speaker on Monday evening was Kathleen Ancker, who spoke on the Catholic Women's Leadership Foundation. Tuesday Keynote Speaker was Fr. Eugene O'Reilly, who spoke on 'Send me'. One resolution was adopted. The collection taken at the Closing Eucharist on Tuesday was divided between Serra House and Catholic Near East Welfare Association (CNEWA).

Hilarion Mitchell was presented with her well-deserved Life Membership at the banquet dinner. The banquet Keynote Speaker was The Most Reverend Bishop John Boissonneau, Auxiliary Bishop, Northern Region.

A special event was the Toronto Diocesan Annual Development Day. It was held virtually, and the theme was 'Here I am Lord; send me', Putting Faith into Action. Guest speakers were Alex Schadenberg, Executive Director of Euthanasia Prevention Coalition and Kathy Matusiak Costa, Executive Director of Compassionate Community Care. Alex gave an update on the widening of MAID for mental health, as well as other issues and cases in Canada and abroad. Kathy highlighted how Compassionate Community Care will help members of the CWL to recognize issues vulnerable people may experience and how to support them, and how to be an effective advocate for the vulnerable. Mary Capobianco, Life Member and Ontario Provincial Council Resolutions Standing Committee Chair, completed the day with next steps, Putting Faith into Action.

Two other special events of note were at the invitation of the Archdiocese of Toronto. I received an invitation to represent Toronto Diocese CWL at the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ Mass, Procession of the Blessed Sacrament and Benediction at St. Michael Cathedral and Basilica on Sunday, June 2, presided by the Most Reverend Francis Leo, Metropolitan Archbishop of Toronto. Five other executive members also represented the diocese. On September 29, at the noon Mass, the Archdiocese honoured the recipients of the inaugural St. Michael Award, recognizing faithful service by members in the Catholic community of the Greater Toronto Area. Three of these recipients are CWL members: Ann Fellin (and her husband Dan) of St. Bonaventure Parish, Central Pastoral Region, Melanie Nazareth, St. Joseph Parish, Mississauga, Western Pastoral Region and Theresa Keogh (and her husband Larry) of St. Paul the Apostle Parish, Alliston, Northern Pastoral Region.

From May to December, as Diocesan President, I visited twenty councils, in which I brought greetings and did a presentation on Spiritual Gifts. This presentation was a combination of recognizing that we all have gifts to offer, and encouraging members to answer the call, 'Here I am Lord; send me', in using their gifts in leadership opportunities in their council.

This is the first year that the Toronto Diocesan Council is in the new structure, and we have embraced it wholly and enthusiastically! This executive is committed to League development, with a focus on introducing members to the wonderful resources found on our national website and to visiting all councils in our two-year term.

Recommendations

- Continue diocesan information sessions to explain each role of the three pillars and reinforce all that can be done at the community/parish level, with a focus on the three chairs working as a 'team'. Sessions should be both virtual and in person.
- Continue diocesan information sessions to explain role of officers. Again, sessions should be both virtual and in person.
- Encourage presidents to mentor their vice president, at the council level and the diocesan level.
- Reinforce that the position of president is for one term only. This is imperative for succession to happen at the council level.
- Encourage every executive position to establish committees. This not only helps to share the workload, but it is also a form of mentoring. As members learn the role, they are more apt to take on a leadership role.

Seventy-five of the 92 councils completed the secretary questions in the 2024 annual report survey.

Communication

Ninety-four percent of the councils used email as the primary method of communication to keep their members informed of resources and special events at various levels of the League. Other methods included: general meetings (65%); telephone committee (57%); word of mouth (44%); communiques/directives/memos (31%) websites (31%) and text (21%). Very few councils used social media which included: Facebook (11%); Instagram (7%).

Councils reported that the executive communicated with members either on a monthly (43%) or on a weekly (41%) basis. Few councils communicated bi-weekly (11%); bi-monthly (4%) and one council reported semi-annually. Seventy three percent had someone assist with communications activities.

National Website

Fifty-four percent of the councils viewed the national League postings on social media and 66% of the councils submitted "Spotlight" articles.

Most councils that accessed the website provided positive feedback. Councils reported that the various resource materials on the website were used during membership drives and special prayer services.

Some of the suggestions for improvement to the website included: have the option to view resources materials before downloading; price list should be easier to find; have a better search feature or even a web chat for quick finds.

Toronto Diocesan Council Secretary 2024 Highlights and Accomplishments

- Attended and recorded Minutes of all diocesan executive, pre-convention, resolutions meetings and all other special meetings. Recorded all motions and updated and maintained the Motion Book.
- Maintained and updated parish information lists with the collaboration of the regional chairs and ensured that the website administrator was advised and changes made accordingly.
- Sent cards to members including Life Members, as well as clergy, for significant life events which included the following: Birthday cards; Christmas cards, Mass cards, anniversary cards, sympathy cards, get well wishes, and other mailings as requested by the President.
- Circulated the weekly Monday correspondence and all other communication requested by the president.
- Received registrations for virtual and in-person events, training workshops, and member development sessions as requested by the president, executive members or subcommittee members. Created and circulated zoom links and details of all executive meetings and events.
- Ensured that all posters, updates, information material or any resources were forwarded to the website administrator and included on the Toronto website.

Recommendations

- Continue to refer to the "Handbook for Secretaries" found on the national website.
- With the recording and corresponding secretary positions merged into one role under secretary, who also absorbed the communications standing committee, it is very important to form sub-committees to handle some of these duties.
- Engage members who are home-bound. For example, members who love to write greeting cards could assist with the correspondence.
- Have members who are digital media savvy, manage your social media (Facebook or Instagram).

Seventy-five of 92 councils participated in the 2024 annual report survey.

Seventy-four percent of councils prepared annual budgets. Ninety-six percent of councils reported that the treasurer gave a financial report at each meeting.

The Annual Parish Treasurer Report was submitted by the councils with totals as shown below. This indicates the monetary donations made by councils.

The data also includes the donations made to the National Voluntary Funds.

- Important to prepare an annual budget for your council. This not only helps in the planning and funding of activities for the year but to determine the status of the council's finances.

Advisor in a consultative capacity

The past president is mostly involved in advising in a consultative capacity.

Past presidents were consulted on policy and procedures including elections by more than half (57%) of the respondents and were also part of the elections committee in sixty-six percent of the councils. It was of special note that the past president was approached by the president for assistance or advice in a large majority of councils (85%). A few reported 'filling in' where necessary, including standing committee chairs, as well as supporting the president and secretary.

Archives and History

The responses in the 2024 Annual Survey indicate that this was a daunting task for councils, as only one-third reported that this was undertaken in 2024. Councils that completed some archival work reported creating or working on a photo album for the council. Photo albums were updated regularly and made available at all CWL member gatherings by some councils. This work was completed by the past president and other members fifty-six percent of the time. It was completed by a fellow member exclusively in four councils, that was reported. Slide presentations were reported by a few councils celebrating milestone anniversaries or to mark the passing of cherished members.

Study and Implementation of Constitution and Bylaws

In 2024 there were numerous revisions to the National Manual of Policy and Procedure. More than one of these revisions was shared at council meetings to keep members updated by most councils (57%). A few of the changes included:

- Councils at all levels can now assign representatives to boards of other organizations.
- Emphasis on the importance of and encouraging the practice of local leadership visits.
- A description of the procedure for reporting deceased members.
- Information on member communication pathways.
- Letter of good standing for members seeking election at all levels.

Some councils reported updating their own Policy and Procedures manual and one council mentioned providing their new spiritual advisor with a copy, so he was aware of the council processes.

Toronto Diocesan 2024 Past President Highlights

As this was an election year the outgoing past president successfully concluded the diocesan elections at the annual convention with a full slate of candidates.

Along with the executive, the updated Diocesan Manual of Policy and Procedure was uploaded to the website on May 1, 2024, for members' ease of access.

As ingoing past president, the following workshops were held:

- How to prepare a Parish Council Policy and Procedure manual in May (in person)
- "Leadership is Behaviour" at a parish council membership appreciation tea.

• Parish elections: virtually (September 18, CWL Wednesday) and in person (October 26). The virtual presentation was also shared with 3 other diocesan councils in Ontario.

Updated the past president checklist for the diocesan website to reflect the changes to the League structure. Also, the reporting process for the Archdiocese of Toronto Needs Assessment through Catholic Charities was completed.

Toronto Diocesan Council Archives for the executive term 2022-2024 are being compiled through information gleaned from minutes, financial statements and other archival materials received from Life Members. The 2011-2021 archives will also be completed by a committee and deposited at the Archives of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Toronto (ARCAT) at an appropriate date.

Patricia Beattie Annual Mentoring Award

At the diocesan convention in April 2024, the Patricia Beattie Annual Mentoring Award for the Parish Level was presented to Mary Grossi, St. Margaret Mary Council, Humber Valley Region.

The Auxiliary Level Recipient was Philomena Menezes, Precious Blood Council, Scarborough Region. The awards were presented by Life Member Carole Pitcher and previous recipient Lucia Vacca.

Recommendations:

- Encourage members to experience the League at all levels including regional meetings, Development Days and conventions.
- Mentor new and current members to develop their skills and strengths through the various webinars provided and encourage them to take on leadership roles.
- Create a *Parish Council Manual of Policy and Procedure* and review or update it every two years.
- Prepare a written summary of your term as president. This is an important part of your council history.
- Keep council records in your parish and refrain from storing in a member's home. Records should be continually updated and sorted. Enlist the help of a few members who enjoy the process, to lighten the load.

Seventy-Five councils completed the 2024 faith questions on the annual report survey.

Spiritual Growth of Members

To assist members in their communal and personal prayer life, councils: used a variety of prayer styles at their meetings (75%); organized or promoted retreats, days of reflection or participation through national webinars (52%); used resources on the national website and promoted participation in national webinars (42%); encouraged members to use apps or subscriptions for daily Mass readings (32%); promoted prayers that are regularly posted to the national website and social media (45%); encouraged spiritual readings, bible study or participation in a book club (44%); sourced the calendar on the national website for faith events and prayers (39%); shared the televised Mass in honour of Our Lady of Good Counsel (30%); developed spiritual programs with the spiritual advisor's guidance and involvement (29%) and prayed the psalter (3%).

Councils incorporated the National Theme "Here I am Lord, send me" by: praying the theme prayer at monthly meetings (53%); shared as a group how members responded to God's call in their lives (37%); discussed the symbolism of the national theme logo (36%); through prayer and reflection on Isaiah 6:8 (32%). Forty percent reported using other methods which included: informative event with speakers for a Catholic funeral and burial; beautiful Fatima Procession each May and October; retreat at the Loyola Centre in Guelph; Corpus Domini and the Feast of the Assumption with a CWL Altar and a procession; Lenten-themed human Bingo; small group discussions on Lenten-themed questions; living Rosary, prayer service for victims of human trafficking on Feast Day of St. Josephine Bakhita and members also took part in a shawl ministry.

Councils prayed for their sick members. The death of a member was celebrated in many ways such as prayers throughout the membership, visitation and prayers at the funeral home; a candle lit Honour Guard at their funeral; prayer service, Mass Intention and name recorded in the Book of Life for deceased members.

Sanctity of Life

Sixty-seven percent of councils advocated for the sanctity of life by promoting pro-life events and encouraged member participation. Fifty-four percent of councils participated in March for Life or similar public pro-life gatherings. Forty percent included pro-life prayers and reports in meetings and engaged in 12 hours of prayers for Palliative Care; twenty-eight percent wrote letters to the government against abortion and or MAID. Fifteen percent took part in 40 Days for Life prayer vigils. Eighteen percent took part in pro-life webinars and guest speaker events. Forty-six percent made donations to pro-life causes. Forty-three percent discussed league position papers. Fifteen percent promoted the CCCB's National Family and Life Week in May.

Vocations

Forty percent of councils supported vocations by praying on World Day for Consecrated Life and/or World Day of Prayer for Vocations. Fifty-four percent hosted special events to celebrate the priest's birthday or anniversary of ordination. Fifteen percent of councils helped consecrated women religious through prayer and/or donations. Some councils

invited a guest speaker on vocations to the ordained ministry and consecrated life, or sponsored League membership to novitiates and/or consecrated women religious. Thirty-five percent pursued other ways to promote vocations; councils offered Spiritual Bouquets for Diocesan spiritual advisors and Ordinandi.

Study of Catholic Teachings

Majority of councils (52%) raised awareness of Catholic resources on the internet, scheduled guest speakers on religious topics. Other methods used by councils included: twenty percent of councils studied or read encyclicals by Pope Francis and encouraged reading of the synodal synthesis document, pastoral letters on the reconciliation with Indigenous peoples; and twenty six percent encourage study of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Twenty three percent participated in the Year of Prayer webinars hosted by the CCCB. Only six percent promoted member participation in the WUCWO's "Conversation of the Spirit"; thirteen percent discussed League position papers.

Ecumenism and Interfaith Endeavors

Seventy-one percent of councils participated in or hosted the World Day of Prayer service. Twenty-six percent worked with other churches in the community to address local concerns; twenty-six percent participated in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity; 3% hosted an information event about another faith and twenty-nine percent promoted ecumenism and interfaith in other ways.

Role of Women

Thirty-seven percent of councils discussed the role of women in the life and mission of the church and shared how members have responded to God's call in their lives. Members served in their parishes as lectors, Eucharistic ministers, ushers, altar servers, hospitality ministers, catechists, parish pastoral council, finance council, funeral committees and others, that promoted our faith.

Toronto Diocesan Faith Chair Highlights

Participated, on behalf of Toronto Diocese, in an Ontario Provincial Council initiative, 'Prayers Across the Province'. Presented an Advent Retreat for a northern council. Organized the readers for the mysteries of the rosary for Rosary Sunday at Martyr's Shrine. Presented "How to Prepare a Prayer Service" at the TDC Fall Workshop. Prepared prayer services for Toronto Diocesan meetings, workshops and training sessions.

Recommendations

- Continue to use the various resources available on the national website.
- Provide opportunities to increase members' faith in a variety of ways.
- Increase support and participation in the promotion of pro-life in their community.
- Continue to support new vocations in a variety of ways as well as offering spiritual bouquets for Bishops, Priests and Ordinandi.
- Form a subcommittee to assist in the various roles under the Faith Standing Committee.

Report of the Vice President

Seventy-five of 92 councils participated in the national 2024 annual report survey. Diocesan council received official notice of disbanding for St. Patrick Phelpston, Northern Region as of January 16, 2024. St. Thomas Aquinas was inactive. Diocesan executive visited this council on May 18, 2024, and provided an information session. The council was reactivated on this date, with a full slate of executive elected.

National Office reported Sts. Martha and Mary Council disbanded as of April 2022. Diocesan executive visited this council and assisted in the membership drive on November 30 and December 1st, with the reactivation of this council to begin in the new year.

Forty-six councils across the diocese either maintained or increased their membership for 2024.

Recruit Members and Retain Membership

Forty-one percent of councils used the National Project: "1" Campaign. All councils encouraged members to invite prospective members; 64% of councils reported using the "Welcome Program" to promote the League with prospective and new members; 85% of council's executives encouraged members and prospective members to visit the national website for information and resources as a recruitment tool and 19% used the "Share the Words (52 reasons to talk about the CWL)" material to promote the League.

Membership drives and pulpit talks were the most popular and well received. One council reported that their pulpit talk/speech outlined some of the many ways that they helped the homeless and the fight against Human Trafficking and the prospect of helping others helped to spark interest in women who were considering joining our CWL The greatest challenges that councils faced with membership included: attracting younger members; aging membership; lack of attendance at meetings; motivating members to take part in seminars or workshops; demographics; attracting new members; keeping members engaged; members not willing to take on a leadership role; members who are very willing to volunteer for special projects but do not want to commit themselves to a specific role or responsibility.

Despite the various challenges that councils were faced with, councils continued to work diligently and tirelessly and used many resources, strategies and initiatives in their work to promote the league, recruit, retain and regain membership and to keep their councils vibrant!

Many councils promoted membership through fund raising events, potlucks, pie making or hosting a game/fun night, being visible in the parish. One council's goal was not only creating a presence through faith, service and social justice within the council, but creating a sense of community and unity within the parish, promoting the league as a vibrant, agile organization aimed at bringing awareness of issues that impact the poor and vulnerable. Councils hosted regular coffee weekend, keeping updated on parish events

and having display tables at these events. Another council gained a few members through a personal outreach and invited parishioners to one of their fundraising events and social night. One council changed the format of their meeting focusing on a specific theme that featured interactive activity which gave members the opportunity to engage, mingle and share ideas within the group. To increase attendance at meetings, one council changed their winter meetings to Sunday afternoons; another council was successful in empowering new members to be actively engaged through a program called "The Final Journey" where speakers talked about the importance of having a will and planning for a Catholic Funeral and Burial. One council included a publication in their quarterly newsletter entitled: "Reflections of a CWL Sister" showing appreciation for their senior members

Life Membership

Leadership Development

The Toronto Diocesan Annual Development Day was held virtually on February 10, 2024. The theme was "*Here I am Lord; send me. Putting Faith into Action*". Guest speakers were Alex Schadenberg, Executive Director of Euthanasia Prevention Coalition and Kathy Matusiak-Costa, Executive Director of Compassionate Community Care.

Leadership Development and Highlights

Workshops presented by Toronto Diocesan Council included: *Dealing with conflict to Reach Win-Win Solution and Being Kind to Each Other; Parish Executive Training; Garden Way of the Cross; Celebrating National Indigenous Peoples Day; Stewardship in the CWL - Elections and Prayer for Peace and Rosary.*

Organized a Fall Workshop and Information Session for Faith, Service and Social Justice, with an additional session on Elections.

Responded to new potential member requests received from National website's "Join" webpage and Toronto Diocesan website.

Visited six councils and assisted with membership/leadership development

Recommendations

- Continue to offer Diocesan Leadership workshops and Parish Executive Training
- Form committees: to handle new member inquiries; assist with member development workshops; and annual reports

Councils are encouraged to:

- Participate in membership campaigns/initiatives offered by all levels of the league.
- Visit the national website for information and resources as a recruitment tool.
- Motivate members to take part in seminars and workshops.
- Reach out to Diocesan Vice President when they are experiencing challenges with membership and/or leadership development.
- Promote the league using the welcome program or "Share the Words (52 reasons to talk about the CWL)" material.

Gabriella Di Pietrantonio

Seventy-four of 92 councils submitted an Annual Report. Most were satisfied with the flow of communication from their service chair and committee. Sixty percent of councils reported that there have been positive changes with the new structure, and a few councils are still working on fully embracing the new structure.

Advocacy and Support Services

Councils were very active in raising awareness on the topics of bullying, racism, human trafficking and homelessness. Some of the actions taken included: guest speakers (e.g BridgeNorth on human trafficking awareness; MAID, dignity of life); prayer services and reflections during monthly general meetings; outreach work with local organizations helping the homeless (e.g. Street Patrol ministry, Coldest Night of the Year, walk for Armagh House, Knights Table, Indwell Homes, Mission Angels, Open Door and Regeneration Brampton); correspondence shared via Parent School Councils and other Parish Councils; OPP presentation on bullying and senior fraud scams; Toronto Police session held on human trafficking; and financial support provided to groups such as Busby Centre and local food banks. One council participated in a 'Stop Human Trafficking flag raising' in their city.

Challenges/Obstacles for Chairperson of Service

An obstacle some councils are working through included new members holding the position and challenged with understanding the requirements of the role.

Some repeated challenges included: difficulty in recruiting new members to take on the role or help in the role; members not being able to allocate time to the position as much as they would like, due to family and career obligation; age demographics of their members; and the roles and duties required of the chair can be a bit daunting and challenging especially for anyone new coming into the role.

Most councils reported that the service chairperson was familiar with material provided on the national website for this standing committee and found the resources adequate.

Effectiveness of the Pillar of Service

Working with the Social Justice and Faith chairs on topics has helped to overcome separating the lines between the committees, and in turn, has made service in some councils a popular practice. Service chairs find the role fulfilling and service is an area where major impact on the lives of people in need, especially in the community, can be made. There is always an abundance of support shown by all members for Service during Youth Awards and the work behind organizing them.

Catholic Education

Councils promoted Catholic education by supporting and sponsoring both elementary and secondary school awards and scholarships. Councils also held the youth awards contests in their parish schools and/or at their parish.

Toronto Diocesan Highlights

A Youth Awards presentation was done at the October in-person TDC Workshop. Questions and positive feedback from the attendees highlighted areas to help parishes and regions hosting the youth awards. The effectiveness of workshops and League development, within the CWL, has led to great appreciation of the efforts put forth by members at all levels of the League.

Recommendations

- Promote the idea of a sub-committee for the Chair with hopes of drawing more interest in the executive council positions: "many hands make light work".
- Selecting topics to act on which are relevant/specific to the parish community, while keeping true to the CWL directives.
- Encourage members to participate in workshops on the various topics offered at all levels of the League, regardless of what Chair it might fall under.
- Continue to encourage participation in the youth awards in parish associate schools and in the parish.
- Continue to acknowledge at your council and in your parish, all students who participate in youth awards.

Christina Boyle

Seventy-five councils completed the 2024 social justice annual survey.

Monitoring Legislation:

Councils monitored or acted on legislation and bylaws at various levels, Federal: (76%); Provincial: (42%); Municipal: (36%).

Some of the federal legislation monitored by councils included the following bills:

S-210 An Act to restrict young person's online access to sexually explicit material

C-322 An Act to develop a national framework to establish a school food program

C-62 An Act to amend the Criminal Code (medical assistance in dying)

C-61 First Nations Clean Water Act

C-73 Nature Accountability Act

Resolutions

Councils acted on resolutions at all levels of the league: National (35%); Provincial (20%); Diocesan (78%). Actions initiated by councils included: Letter writing campaigns (44%); postcard campaigns (37%); petitions (39%); briefs (17%); consideration or drafting of a resolution that has not yet been submitted (17%) and submission of a resolution to diocesan provincial or national levels (12%).

Councils reported using a variety of social justice resources found on the national website which included: Toolkit for Social Justice (27%); Catholic Social teaching manuals and workshops (22%); the Resolutions Handbook, Guide and workshops (22%); Indigenous relations materials (17%); legislation and advocacy workshops (9%); councils that reported that they were not aware of any of these resources (6%) or were aware of the resources but did not use them (44%).

Catholic Social Teaching

Councils reported the following areas of Catholic Social teaching were addressed through discussions, actions or both: Uphold the life and dignity of the human person (77%); advocate for the poor and vulnerable and their inclusion in society (75%); care for God's creation (42%) and (13%) advocated for the dignity of work and equal rights of workers. Many councils worked to promote awareness of sex trafficking and advocated for causes that helped victims of human trafficking, by holding workshops and invited speakers from the police services and victims' organizations to speak at meetings. Members became involved in social justice topics such as Right to Life, MAID, Euthanasia Coalition, Compassionate Community Care, access to palliative care, pornography and other causes advocating for the poor and vulnerable in society. An increase in member attendance was reported when there was a guest speaker on these topics. One council reported that members facilitated the "Horizons of Hope Program - A Toolkit for Catholic Parishes on Palliative Care" for all interested parishioners which was well received. Another council reported that members, with the support of their pastor, facilitated a parish Development and Peace campaign "Stand for the Land", in support of communities in Honduras who were struggling with contamination of their land and water. One council reported that by putting on a program to celebrate "National Day for Truth and Reconciliation", helped to increase their awareness of the need for reconciliation. To mark the Earth hour and Earth Day, one council reported participating in various initiatives and activities to care for our planet.

Impact of social justice activities on members

Councils rated the impact of the council's social justice activities on members as follows: very positive (39%); somewhat positive (26%); not positive (3%) and unsure (32%).

Highlights from Social Justice Chair

One resolution: *TDC: 2024.01 National Food Program* was presented and passed at the Toronto Diocesan Convention on April 30, 2024. This resolution was brought forward and passed at the Ontario Provincial Convention in July 2024 for subsequent consideration and presentation at the National Convention in August 2024. Due to the subsequent Federal Government's announcement and the commitment of funds to implement a National School Program for all, this resolution was not presented at the National Convention. Councils are encouraged to monitor the government's response to this resolution.

Toronto Diocesan Highlights

Since taking on this role in April 2024

- Worked with the faith chair and put together a CWL Wednesday in June 2024 to celebrate National Indigenous Peoples Day. Our guest speaker helped members understand the importance of the land to all indigenous peoples, and members had the chance to review their Land Acknowledgement for possible improvements, based on new information.
- Developed a regular Zoom meeting schedule for all the Social Justice Chairs and those interested in Social Justice issues across the diocese. These meetings facilitated the sharing of ideas and social justice projects taking place in councils across the Toronto diocese. These will continue to be held through 2025.
- Participated in a member development day that was held in October 2024.
 A short workshop on how to get started writing a Resolution was provided to our members. As a result of this workshop, it opened the opportunity to engage with and assist councils that had started to develop ideas on five possible resolutions topics.

Recommendations

- Encourage the Social Justice Chairs and others on the council executive to make better use of social justice and other resources available on the national website.
- Continue to monitor resolutions at all levels of the League.
- Invite more councils to consider supporting international organizations like Development and Peace and Canadian Near East Welfare Association (CNEWA).
- More councils to consider offering the Horizons of Hope program
- Continue to offer workshops on resolutions to generate a greater interest in the overall process of writing and implementing of a resolution
- Continue engaging and informing members on social justice issues, through information sessions and diocesan-wide meetings.

As of December 31, 2024, there were a total of 584 subscriptions, which included the Diocesan Executive, Life Members, Regional Spiritual Advisors, Regional Chairs, council executives, parish council Spiritual Advisors and members. This number represents a 15.6% decrease from 2023.

The Toronto Diocesan Newsletter raises awareness and promotes the work of the League. It is an extremely useful resource and a must for all council executives, spiritual advisors, life members and members. The articles prepared by the Toronto Diocesan executive officers and chairperson for faith, service and social justice are on current and upcoming initiatives, events and activities which apply to them based on the Constitution and Bylaws, Policy and Procedures from the diocese, and communiques and directives from other levels of the League.

The newsletter highlights special projects, events, resolutions, council anniversaries, member milestone years of service and extraordinary awards which include, Maple Leaf Service Pin and Life Member awards. It is published three times per year in the Spring, Fall and Winter.

The following are the deadline dates for submissions from the TDC Executives:

Spring January 30 (March to June - to arrive in the mail by March 1)

Fall July 30 (September to November - to arrive in the mail by September 1) Winter October 30 (December to February - to arrive in the mail by December 1)

Any changes in information of executives, addresses or deceased subscribers should be sent in immediately in order to keep the data accurate and up-to-date. This ensures that your newsletter information is accurate and subscribers receive it on a timely basis. This will also reduce undue costs for undelivered mail.

Recommendations

- Subscriptions are to be renewed early in January to ensure uninterrupted delivery. Be sure to indicate unit or apartment number. Use the form on our website cwltoronto.ca and be sure to include the parish, region, the contact name and phone number.
- Budget a subscription of the newsletter for your executive, Spiritual Advisor, Life Member and encourage all members to also subscribe.
- Consider subsidizing the cost for general members in your council to receive these newsletters.

The Archdiocese of Toronto covers a large area, from Penetanguishene in the north to Brampton in the west, Oshawa in the east and Lake Ontario to the south. Our Toronto diocesan CWL parish councils are wide spread and very diverse. In this light, it is very challenging to bring our Life Members together for personal encounters. We generally do this at our Toronto Diocesan Council Convention where, thanks to Margaret Ann Jacobs, our Honorary Life Member, we can sit for business sessions at a designated table adorned with the tablecloth embroidered with the names of fifty-one past presidents. We usually have lunch together once during convention.

Mary Quinlan - December 25, 1933 to October 4, 2024

Mary spent most of her life in Mississauga, most recently as a parishioner of St. Peter and Paul Catholic Church. She initiated the birth of several councils and contributed to the CWL community. She lived in Montreal for twenty-five years and was Montreal Archdiocesan President from 1968 to 1970 and Quebec Provincial President from 1975 to 1977.
